NEWS

Out of concern for our safety, our bishop has not yet authorized a general and total re-opening of all parishes. Check www.diocesetucson.org, the website of the Diocese of Tucson, for ongoing news.

Due to the large number of members of our parish who are senior citizens (including our pastor and most of our liturgical ministers), many of whom have underlying health conditions, we need to put a lot of thought into carefully planning our gatherings. Some parishes will open sooner than we do. We are in the process of working out the logistics of having Masses and other gatherings here in the safest possible manner while the rate of new infections and death rate from COVID-19 continues to rise in our state.

Although we do not yet think it safe to hold Masses or any other large group gatherings indoors, with the bishop's approval, we do distribute Holy Communion in the west parking lot of St. Frances Cabrini Church at the following times: 5:00 to 5:20 p.m. on Saturday, and 8:30 to 8:50 and 10:00 to 10:20 a.m. on Sunday. This will happen each weekend until further notice.

We ask that everyone please wear masks, stay in your vehicles, and follow the signs for traffic flow. As you drive beside where he is standing, near the northwest church entrance, Fr. Jay or one of the Eucharistic Ministers, wearing mask and gloves, will reach through your open window and hand you the number of consecrated hosts required for the people in your car who wish to receive it.

A parish member with a collection basket, in mask and gloves, will be standing on the way to the designated exit to receive any offering envelopes people may wish to bring. Please put the envelope in the basket through your window.

Fr. Jay has been sending weekly letters to all parish members for whom we have email addresses. When we are ready to further expand services at our parish, he will let you know in an upcoming letter, and we will also put the information in the bulletin, which we post on our parish website. If we don't have your email address and you would like to receive these letters by email, please contact us at cabrini1962@aol.com.

If you know someone who does not have Internet access and who might like to be mailed paper copies of Fr. Jay's letters and/or our bulletins, ask them to call the office (326-7670) and let us know. We will be happy to send them.



POVERELLO HOUSE SEEKS Whoever TRIAGE VOLUNTEERS

Poverello House, a daytime shelter serving homeless men in the Franciscan tradition, is one of the programs of the Diocese of Tucson. Located at 221 E. Lee St., they have had to remain closed during the early part of



the COVID-19 epidemic, but the staff would like to begin providing limited services to homeless men again starting on July 15 (tentative date). From 7:00 a.m. until noon, on Wednesdays through Sundays, men who were guests at Poverello House prior to its closing will be welcomed into the yard for a hot breakfast, an opportunity to take a shower and do laundry, and a place to relax in the shade. Volunteers are needed to provide triage from 7:00 to 8:00 a.m., before the men enter the yard. Training will be provided if needed. Sat., 7/18, St. Camillus de Lellis, 1550-1614, Italian; after a wild youth he became a priest and founded an order dedicated to the care of the sick; patron saint of the sick, hospitals, nurses and physicians; also those seeking aid to overcome addiction to gambling.
