# **DONATING \$ TO ST. VINCENT DE PAUL (SVDP)**

Did you know that your cash donations to SVDP may qualify you for a tax credit on your AZ State Income Tax Return? The Arizona Qualified Charitable Organ-



ization tax credit provides for a dollar-for-dollar reduction on your tax liability: up to \$421 for a single person; \$841 on a joint return. And your donation does not have to be made in a lump sum. It can be made in smaller amounts throughout the year. The credit is claimed on **AZ Form 321** using **Code 20768**. Questions? # DECEMBER 12TH IS THE FEAST DAY OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE.

Like Our Lady of La Vang, Our Lady of Guadalupe is an apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary, who has appeared in different times and places, always radiantly shining, but speaking the language and having the appearance of a lady of the particular place where she appears, showing that she wants to be the Mother and refuge of us all.



In 1531, only ten years after the Spanish conquest of the Aztecs, she appeared to St. Juan Diego, a humble native Mexican peasant, on 4 occasions. Most of the apparitions took place on a hill in the Colona Villa de Guadalupe, a former separate town, now a neighborhood in northern Mexico City. The Lady, who spoke to him in his native language, told Juan that her name was Maria (Mary), that she was the Mother of the true God, and she would be as a mother to him. She cured his sick uncle, and she assured him of her constant help.

In her last appearance, on Dec. 12, 1531, she told him she wanted a church built in her honor in that place. She put roses of Castile in his cloak, which he took to the Spanish bishop. When he opened his cloak to show the bishop, not only did they see the roses, which were not native to Mexico, but, imprinted miraculously on the cloak was an image of Our Lady, with straight, dark hair and the appearance of a beautiful native Mexican woman, wearing a pink dress and a blue robe spangled with stars, her hands folded in prayer, surrounded by rays of light. She stood on a crescent moon, supported by a cherub angel.

The basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe was built and stands today in Mexico City, and Juan Diego's cloak is preserved in a special shrine. Within seven years of this apparition of the Blessed Mother, millions of native Mexicans had accepted the Catholic Faith. Our Lady of Guadalupe became venerated as the Patroness of Mexico, and then the Patroness of the Americas generally. She is venerated by Catholics throughout Central, South, and North America, and also is much beloved in the Philippines. However, her Feast Day under this title is not a Holy Day of Obligation in this country. The 10:30 Mass choir will sing some hymns in her honor today.

#### **ADVENT CONFESSIONS**

Usually, the Sacrament of Confession/Reconciliation is available for half an hour before each of the weekend Masses. Confession times will be increased to one hour before each of the weekend Masses on the Advent weekends of Dec. 9-10, 16-17, and 23-24. Receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation is a beautiful way to get ready for the coming of Jesus into our hearts in a special way at Christmas time.
