Symbolism of the Advent Wreath

The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God. The evergreen is chosen as the base because green is the color that represents hope and new life. The 4 candles represent the 4 weeks of Advent. The first two purple candles symbolize hope and love, respectively. The third candle, which is pink, symbolizes joy. The fourth and last purple candle represents peace. Sometimes a white candle is placed in the middle of the wreath to signify the Savior, but the light of all the candles together also signifies the light of Christ to humankind, as does the Christmas star, or star of Bethlehem, which appeared at the birth of Jesus.
